Dear Families,

This week our Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 students are sitting NAPLAN tests. The NAPLAN tests are a national test, every school in the country administers the test. The test is intended to provide school and parents with a snapshot of each child's learning progress. The test does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with additional information about students' educational progress. NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through our regular school curriculum. There is no need for children to do additional preparation for tests outside school. This year students are being tested earlier than usual and all schools now undertake the tests online. This means the tests are more tailored to each child as the test presents questions which may be more, or less difficult depending on a student's responses. Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. Another change this year will be in how the results are presented for parents with results presented in a simpler format.

This week we have celebrated Harmony Day. Harmony Day is a day of cultural respect for everyone who calls Australia home – from the traditional owners of this land to those who have come from many countries around the world. By participating in Harmony Day activities, we can learn and understand how

all Australians from diverse backgrounds equally belong to this nation and enrich it. Toodyay DHS celebrated Harmony Day this year on Tuesday 21st March. On this day our students celebrated Harmony Day by being involved in a shared lunch on the central grassed area. I would like to give a big shout out to our year ten student leaders who organised and cooked the mammoth sausage sizzle for the entire school! Thank you to all of the students and staff who wore orange on this day to acknowledge the celebration of Harmony Day.

I would like to formally wish Ms Kate Child our HaSS teacher the best of luck with her future as she moves to retirement. Ms Child has worked at our school for 18 months and supported the school with her immense knowledge and skill in her learning area. Ms Child's last day will be Friday 24th March 2023. The school is working hard to back fill Ms Child from the beginning of term 2.

Thursday 6th April is the last day of Term 1 and students will be finishing at 2.30pm. School will resume after the school holidays on Wednesday 26th of April.

Harmony Day in Pre Primary

They completed a 'cut up photo' activity whereby they had to choose their own eyes, but another child's mouth, nose and forehead to each complete a face photo. Year 6 News



In Design and Technology, Year 6 students have been exploring types of energy transfers, culminating in an investigation into, and designing a Goldberg Machine to see simple energy transfers in action. Students' machines incorporated kinetic, gravitational potential, and sound energy.

Students were required to use everyday items from the classroom or home to design, then build a 'machine' that moved something through a series of energy transfers. The project incorporated drawing a design model that included descriptive but succinct annotations, and identified the different energy transfers along the circuit. Students then built their machine, conducted trials, made appropriate changes to improve the machine, then described and justified the changes.

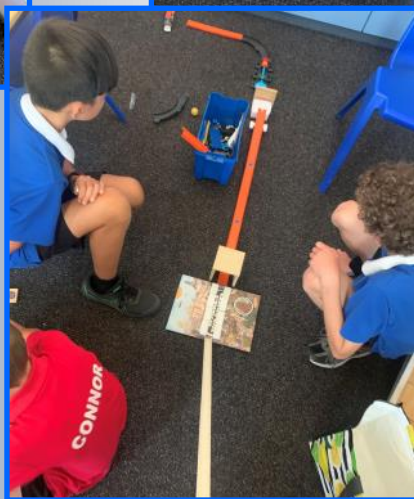
Students were creative, organised and reflective. Watching the facial expressions as models didn't quite work as planned, or elation as the marble successfully knocked down the dominoes was delightful! All students' participation, enthusiasm and conduct is a credit to the group. I can't wait to facilitate the next investigation!

"Outcome – The outcome was that the tennis ball was too big for the PVC and for that reason we changed it to a large marble. Someone forgot the cardboard so instead of the cardboard we put footy card binders in its place." Cohen.

"I changed it [a table to a chair] because the table was too big so the marble went over the MAB block [instead of hitting into it]." Ryan.



"I thought it was not going to work because it kept failing. But then it worked really well. The change that we went with was, instead of one idea [individual machines] we changed into combining all our ideas [to make one machine.]" Mikayla.

Mr Holmes and the Toodyay RSL are running drill training for our Cadets and preparing them for ANZAC services, which is very important in our community.

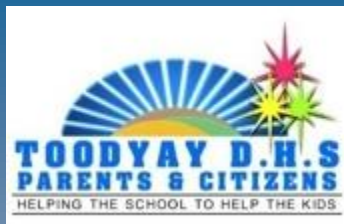
