
OLNA pregualification and Year 9 2023 NAPLAN

Year 9 parents will be aware that there have been changes to the way that NAPLAN is reported. Instead of Bands, it is now communication in four proficiency levels - Exceeding, Strong, Developing and Needs Additional Support. This has a flow on effect to the prequalification for OLNA. In the past, students were required to have reached Band 8 to prequalify for OLNA. Now, however, the point for pregualification is found within the 'Strong' proficiency level. Schools do not yet have access to the finegrained data that will enable us to determine who needs to sit OLNA. As soon as this becomes available, students and parents will be notified. 



Procedure: Toodyay District High School Dress Code

Clothing

Shirts are to be royal blue polo shirts with a white collar and school emblem. A commemorative Year 6/Year 10 or other curriculum designed shirt may be worn. Windcheaters and school jackets are royal blue with school emblem. Shorts, Pants, Skirts or Skorts must be black with no noticeable stripes, logos or motifs. School shorts must be at an appropriate length. *

If leggings or tights are worn, then appropriate black school shorts are to be worn over the top.

Hats must be worn outdoors at all times. School faction brimmed hats are strongly recommended. Sports Uniform to be worn at interschool sports will be black skirts, skorts or shorts with a blue school uniform polo shirt with a school logo

School uniforms are available from Cadds Fashion Surf and Sport in Northam, open on Monday to Friday 9.00 am to 5.00pm and Saturday, 8.30am to 12 noon.

School Excursions require full school uniform being black shorts, pants, skirts or skorts and royal blue school uniform shirts and jumpers or jackets with school logo.

Footwear must be appropriate and comfortable. For safety reasons, thongs are not permitted.

The following items are not permitted: Hoodies, tank tops, singlets, see through garments, midriff tops, thongs, The wearing of the school uniform proudly identifies our high heels. Shorts, dresses, skirts must be mid-thigh

> with hands by your side, the finger tips do not reach past the bottom of the shorts or skirt.

Fashion type jewellery is not permitted. Children may have a single stud or sleeper earring in each ear only. No

Toodyay DHS School bucket hats are strongly encouraged, as they offer the best protection. Hats are not to have visible graffiti. Students who choose not to wear a hat will be required to remain in the shaded veranda areas.

Footwear

Sensible, comfortable closed footwear is to be worn at all times. Preferably on days of PE children wear sports shoes.

Makeup & Hair

Make up and brightly coloured nail polish are not considered appropriate for children at school. Students with hair longer that shoulder length will have it tied back.

Casual Days, Camps and Sports Days

On Casual Days, camps and Sports Days, Sun Safe and jewellery dress code applies. Appropriate footwear is to be worn. Bathing suits are to be consistent with the sporting activity.

*Consequences of Inappropriate dress

Students who arrive in attire that does not meet the dress code will be asked to wear a school polo shirt as their outer garment. Secondary form teachers will ensure compliance during morning form. Primary teachers will do uniform check first thing in the morning. If needed, the student will be sent to the Administration where they will be offered a borrowed uniform and expected to swap their incorrect item of clothing for the day. The student item will then be swapped back at the end of the day. A student who refuses to comply with the Uniform policy will be managed using the Toodyay Managing Behaviour policy.

Responsibility

Parents: Acceptance of enrolment at Toodyay DHS assumes an agreement between the school, parent/carer and the enrolling student to follow the dress code. Parents will be expected to supply suitable clothing for the child's use in school activities. Issues of financial hardship can be discussed with the Principal or Manager of Corporate Services. Parents will be notified either by phone, letter or diary if their child is not wearing appropriate clothing. Parents are expected to notify the school either personally or in writing if their child is unable to wear the correct uniform. Second Hand uniforms are often available from the Toodyay Op Shop.

Exemption: DOE Policy states that Principals may exempt students from the Dress Code Policy upon written request from the parents, on the following grounds:

- Religious, Cultural or ethnic
- New student (two weeks to purchase)/Itinerant students
- When there is a genuine medical or family reason for not wearing uniform, the school should be informed in writing.

All students are required to wear clothing consistent with the School's Dress Code at all times.

School Notices

LOST PROPERTY

Please ensure that your child/ren has their name clearly labelled on their school uniform/clothes. We had a huge amount of unclaimed clothing that was taken to the op shop beginning of the year. The lost property is kept in TA3, the Chaplains room.

Water Bottles

Please make sure your child has a water bottle for the day, as phase 4 COVID restrictions are still in place. Therefore students cannot drink directly from the water fountains but can fill water bottles.

Students leaving the School during school time Kindy-Year 10

All parents needing to collect their child during school hours are now required to go via the front office and sign out. This will generate a yellow slip that is given to the class teacher. Following this process provides the school with increased accountability on your child's whereabouts.

Head Lice

As you will know, head lice are small insects that live in human hair. The eggs look like grains of salt stuck to the hair and most often are found behind the ears and along the forehead and temples.

Head lice are very common, particularly in schools where children often have their heads close together. Head lice can live in the cleanest hair. They don't make you sick, but can cause itching, especially in children, so you may have noticed your child scratching lately.

Your child can return to school when treatment has commenced, Initial treatment includes the application of treatment and the removal of eggs and live lice. Please be aware this is an ongoing 10 day treatment (to break the life cycle) and then a weekly check thereafter.

It is very important to check the rest of the family and other close contacts for head lice too. Please tell others your child associates with, so that the chance of infestation is minimized.

Book Club catalogues will be sent home with students and ordering is now online only.

GENERAL INFORMATION

VISITORS TO THE SCHOOL SITE

All visitors to the school are required to sign in at the main office. Should you need to see your child, then a member of staff will collect them from the classroom.

THE SCHOOL SITE AFTER HOURS

Parents/carers are reminded that the school site is out of bounds after hours. People are requested not to use the school grounds as a "shortcut" as any access is unauthorised. Police have been conducting walk-throughs of the school. Any repeated unauthorised access may result in a complaint to the police and a trespass order being issued.

STUDENTS ON SCHOOL GROUNDS

Breakfast Club commences at 8.15am so no student should be at school before 8.15am. Unless attending Breakfast Club or arriving by school bus which may drop students here early, children should not be at school before 8.30am on school days. The school grounds are out of bounds after hours and on weekends.

COMPLAINTS AND INCIDENTS AFFECTING THE SCHOOL'S REPUTATION

From time to time, an issue that affects the school occurs within the community. This information is often posted on social media and the incident can be misrepresented and misinterpreted. Should parents/carers become aware of such an issue we request that you contact the Principal so that the issue can be dealt with directly. We have a complaints process which will be followed. Toodyay DHS is your school and any negative public discussions affect all of the students who are enrolled here. We are proud of our school and work hard to create a positive environment.

AMBULANCE

When a child is injured, parents/carers will be called. If there is any doubt about the injury, an ambulance will be called. Parents/carers are advised to ensure they have ambulance cover as ambulance costs will be the responsibility of the parents/carer (not the school).

SCHOOL PICK UP/DROP OFF


Please do not use the staff office parking area and driveway as a pick up or drop off point for students.

Zones of Regulation

This year we are continuing to implement The Zones of Regulation across the school (K-10) as a part of a whole school approach towards self-regulation.

This approach is designed to help students learn to identify their feelings and emotional reactions and learn strategies to encourage better self-regulation across different situations. A simple color-coded, four-zones format encourages learning. With optimum learning happening when students are in the Green Zone. Students also learn how to use strategies or tools to stay in a zone or move from one zone to another.

You may hear and see students using *Zone language* throughout the school and we encourage parents to speak with their child or child's teacher regarding this approach.
